 - In response to worldwide challenges related to the outbreak of COVID-19, the Department of State is suspending routine visa services in most countries worldwide. Embassies and consulates in these countries will cancel all routine immigrant and nonimmigrant visa appointments as of March 18, 2020.
 - Department of State has compiled a list of embassy websites for country-specific information concerning COVID-19 at the link above. This page provides links to the COVID-19 dedicated page for each nation's embassy which includes information concerning health services, recommendations, and in some cases, information concerning a reduction or temporary suspension of visa services.

U.S. CUSTOMS AND BORDER PROTECTION:

- CBP Boston Logan, JFK and Newark Airport Extending Visa Waiver Program (VWP) during COVID-19
 - If your client lives in the jurisdiction covered by Boston Logan Deferred office and is in the US under the Visa Waiver Program (VWP), where their 90 day duration of stay is due in the next 14 days or less, CBP at Boston Logan confirmed that they will review and grant Satisfactory Departure on a case by case basis.
 - CBP Logan Process (for now): If individuals were admitted under the VWP/ESTA program AND are unable to depart the U.S. before their current period of admission(must be within the 14 days or less from the date of request) because of COVID-19 related issues such as, believe that they may have been exposed to COVID-19 <u>OR</u> are not able to board a flight because they are experiencing ANY flu-like symptoms (such as a runny nose, headache, cough, sore throat or fever) <u>OR</u> No available flights, OR other related health reasons, may submit a request (individually or through their attorney) to CBP Logan Deferred Inspection office via email: <u>cbp.boston.i94@cbp.dhs.gov</u>, with the following information:
 - Subject line: VWP Satisfactory Departure
 - Body of Email: Individual's name; Date of Birth (DOB); Passport Number; I-94 number and expiration date; Reason for request
 - Attach to the email: Passport biographic Page; I-94; Original departure flight itinerary along with the new flight itinerary, if available; Evidence to support the request, if available
 - Please do not call Deferred Inspection office to follow up. Each individual will be notified of their decision.

 - <u>Asylum Offices</u>: USCIS asylum offices will send interview cancellation notices and automatically reschedule asylum interviews. When the interview is rescheduled, asylum applicants will receive a new interview notice with the new time, date and location of the interview.
